


# SHIFTING Paving the way to 2030 /SANDS

The first Impact/Failure Conclave was held in April 2018. Rohini Nilekani, an Indian author and philanthropist, opened the deliberations and noted how conversations around failure needed to come out in public.

Everyone of us, in the impact sector, need platforms to help us to normalize those discussions. Failure, however, as a term has been gravely misunderstood, and is typically associated with 'lack of success' or 'non-occurrence'. But as we saw in the first two editions of the Impact/ Failure Conclave- failures in the impact sector are much more nuanced. Everyone in the social sector work with complex wicked problems, with an aim to create long term impact. Thus 'success' and 'impact' become transitionary- changing with time, scale or new vantage points and learnings, which emerge over time.

The first Impact/ Failure conclave opened up the dialogue by deep and hard hitting self reflections of individual failures. Speakers shared their OWN experiences at various levels of conceptual and operational failures. The second conclave pushed boundaries beyond the binary nature of failure and revealed critical learnings highligting 'successes in failures and failures in successes'.

Expanding and analyzing the grey areas in both success and failure, it created a potent field for not only discussing failures but in-fact celebrating them for their ability to transform mindsets.

Today, we stand at a time when humanity continues to be challenged by two of the biggest threats -growing inequality and climate change: and unfortunately we no longer have the luxury of time. There is no denying that both threats are the result of systemic failure of the State, Markets and Society collectively. As we all buckle down in the next 5 years, and work towards 2030, delving into learnings becomes even more relevant and important.

Are there some bigger cracks that are going unnoticed? Do we need to re-think the assumptions behind our programs?

#### Failure of Development Programs in Africa

#### Humanitarian Energy Lessons Learned - Bridging Short-term Relief with Long-term Investments

Energy access in humanitarian contexts often fails due to fragmented funding, short-term planning, and a lack of expertise and coordination among stakeholders. Around 90% of refugees lack access to electricity and 80% rely on traditional biomass for cooking, due to emergency-driven approaches prioritising immediate needs, therefore sidelining sustainable energy solutions. Limited engagement with displaced communities and host governments exacerbates the challenge, leading to poorly designed energy systems that are inefficient or abandoned. With humanitarian needs rising and proven energy access technologies accessible, it is essential to learn from past humanitarian energy programming to integrate best practices on energy planning and implementation into humanitarian and development strategies and avoid repeating past inefficiencies. This session will review emerging lessons learned on what works (and doesn't) for how to deliver clean energy access, sustainably, in humanitarian contexts.

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#### Navigating Failures: Government's Perspective

When we think of scale, welfare, and equity, the government's role is pivotal. It is squarely positioned to drive impactful development initiatives, yet it operates within vast and intricate systems with often limiting structures and ways of working. Navigating these complexities can be challenging, and failure within such a critical system is not only difficult to accept but often hard to dissect because of the different layers of implementation. This session offers a chance to hear from those working within the government, sharing their perspectives on how they understand and manage failures.

#### Workshop: Presencing - Seven Practices from Transforming Systems & Self

In this deep-dive session, Otto Scharmer explores the transformative potential of awareness-based systems change, drawing on the foundational principles of Theory U. He discusses how systems can only evolve when consciousness shifts, emphasizing that deep transformation requires individuals and collectives to reflect deeply on their relationships and patterns of interaction—the unseen "soil" of the social field.

Using powerful metaphors and real-world examples, Otto illustrates the shift from extractive, efficiency-driven models to regenerative, ecosystem-centric approaches across sectors such as agriculture, education, business, and governance. He highlights the critical role of leadership, listening, and presence in navigating disruption and creating the conditions for collective creativity to emerge.

This session is both a reflection and a call to action for those seeking to activate "islands of coherence" in a world facing profound challenges. By cultivating the capacity to sense and act from the emerging future, participants will gain new insights into the inner and outer shifts required to foster systemic transformation for a regenerative, intentional, and inclusive world.
